StepIn! Project Finalization

After two years of successful pan-European cooperation the StepIn! Project is coming to an end. From January 2012 to December 2013, the project team has jointly worked for inclusive societies and an active participation of migrants and minorities in Europe. The project partners from seven European countries – Germany, Italy, Scotland (GB), Slovenia, Sweden, the Czech Republic and Cyprus – have exchanged experiences and commonly developed training modules for adult education professionals. These have been tested in national workshops and a European training and published in a handbook.



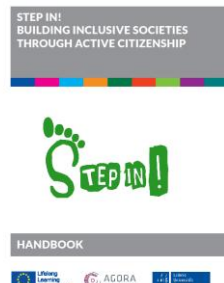

Training Course in November 2013



The Grundtvig Training Course in Hannover

Die Grundtvig Training Course “Promoting social inclusion by fostering migrants’ active citizenship and intercultural competences of adult education professionals” took place from November 18th to 22nd, 2013 in Hannover, Germany. Experts coming from the seven partner countries of the StepIn! Project participated in the seminar.

The program included theoretical inputs, practical exercises and offered a platform for exchange among the participants. The training course introduced the seven modules of the handbook and presented methods for the inclusion of migrants and the development of key competences. Part of the program was also a meeting in the Town Hall of Hannover where local strategies for the inclusion of migrants were discussed.
